The UWM Honors College Vision

A site of undergraduate excellence, the UWM Honors College promotes both a caring community and academic achievement with a particular emphasis on scholarly inquiry, critical thinking, effective reading, writing, and speaking, and individual achievement. Open to qualified undergraduates from across the university, the Honors College offers its students individualized attention in class, in advising sessions, and throughout their years of study. Upon graduation, Honors College students have completed a curriculum set within a liberal arts framework that extends from the arts and humanities to the social and natural sciences. Honors seminars provide a forum for discussion as well as intensive practice in extended analysis, close reading, and effective writing and speaking. In addition to seminars, the UWM Honors College encourages writing a Senior Thesis, completing a Senior Project, conducting faculty-sponsored Research in Honors, Independent Study, and Study Abroad. Our goal is to prepare Honors students for success beyond graduation, whatever their chosen field.

The UWM Honors College History and Present

The University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee's Honors College has been an important part of UWM since it was founded in 1960 by Dr. Herman Weil, Professor of Psychology. Set within the university's large, urban setting, the Honors College offers all of the benefits of a small liberal arts college, in tandem with the benefits of a major research university, to a select group of students.

Honors College students come from a wide range of academic and cultural backgrounds reflecting the diversity of UWM's student body. The Honors College faculty, many of whom have received prestigious teaching awards, are among UWM's best. They lead small seminars, giving Honors students the opportunity to work closely with top scholars and educators, and because the Honors College enrolls a limited number of students, Honors faculty and staff are able to give each student a high level of individual attention both inside and outside the classroom.

The Honors College helps students develop the skills and confidence they need to succeed after college, whether in the professional world or in post-graduate education.

Admission Requirements

Students pursuing their first undergraduate degree may join the Honors College as freshmen, continuing UWM, or transfer students. High school students admitted to UWM are automatically considered for the Honors College based upon a holistic approach comprised of their high school record, ACT scores, and UWM application materials. Continuing UWM and transfer students must have a cumulative GPA appropriate for their year in school (see below) and have met the University English requirement by completing ENG 101 & 102, with a B- or better, or by testing out of the English composition requirement during placement testing. All students new to the Honors College must meet with an Honors advisor to discuss how Honors College courses are integrated into their course of study.

Continuing in the Honors College

Honors College students must meet the following cumulative GPA/enrollment criteria:

A. To continue in the Honors College, students must maintain the following minimum grade point averages for work done at UWM by the beginning of their year in school:

Freshmen (after first semester)	3.0
Sophomores	3.3
Juniors	3.4
Seniors/to graduate with an Honors degree	3.5

- Students admitted as new freshmen who need to complete the University English В. requirement must complete Honors 200 in the first semester following the completion of the requirement.
- C. Students who do not take Honors courses for two consecutive semesters will be considered "inactive" and may be dropped from the Honors College unless approved in advance by an Honors College advisor.

Graduating with an Honors Degree

Students who complete 21 Honors College credits, and achieve a 3.5 cumulative GPA, or higher, receive the Honors Degree—the highest undergraduate degree attainable at UWM. In addition, students who earn six credits over two semesters, by completing a Senior Thesis, Senior Project, or Research in Honors, receive a special designation of "Honors with Distinction" on their transcript. Graduating with an Honors Degree provides convincing evidence of outstanding academic achievement, a valuable accomplishment students can highlight on resumes and graduate, law, and medical school applications.

Introductory Honors Seminars

Honors 200 (The Shaping of the Modern Mind; 3H cr): Introductory course required of all students entering the Honors College. We recommend that freshmen repeat Honors 200 once with a change in topic; however, they may only enroll in one section per semester. Honors 200 may not be repeated after earning Honors credits at the 300 level or higher.

Math 221 (Honors Calculus I; 5H cr): A high Math Placement Test score is required to enroll in Honors Calculus I. This course can be taken concurrently with Honors 200. Students will receive 5 Honors credits for completion of Math 221.

Math 222 (Honors Calculus II; 5H cr): Open only to students who have successfully completed Math 221, Honors Calculus I. This course can be taken concurrently with Honors 200. Students will receive 1 Honors credit for completion of Math 222.

To satisfy graduation requirements in the Honors College, you must complete 21 credits in courses approved for Honors credit, as follows:

Honors 200
Upper-level Honors seminars
Non-Seminar Options

3 to 6 credits at least 9 credits up to 9 credits

Honors courses cannot be audited or taken with the credit/no credit option. <u>Students must earn at least a B- in an Honors course to earn Honors credit</u>. Non-Seminar options include: independent study, Research in Honors, study abroad, a graduate seminar (numbered 700 or above), or a Senior Thesis or Senior Project.

Upper-Level Honors Seminars

Departmental Honors Seminars (3H cr): Offered by departments across campus, these Honors courses are non-technical, general liberal arts seminars, which may be repeated with a change in topic to a maximum of 9H cr (excluding Honors 380, which may only be repeated once with a change in topic for a total of 6H cr). Honors College students are eligible to enroll in these courses once they successfully complete Honors 200 and achieve sophomore standing. Here is a sampling:

Credit in the Major

Many departmental Honors seminars count toward the major in their respective departments, but students are required to contact the department for approval. Research in Honors (Honors 686), the Senior Honors Project (Honors 687) and Senior Honors Thesis (Honors 689), Independent Study, and Study Abroad may also count toward the major with the permission of the department. In advance of pursuing an Honors College non-seminar option, students should discuss the options with both their school/college academic advisor, as well as an Honors advisor.

^{**}NOTE: These classes are not specific to students in these majors. All students in the Honors College are able to enroll in these courses to fulfill General Education Requirements**

<u>Senior Thesis, Project, Research, and Other Non-Seminar</u> <u>Options</u>

Students <u>must</u> contact the Honors College office *before* registering for any of the following courses. Special registration procedures and firm deadlines apply.

Advanced Independent Study (3H cr): Independent study courses offered through departments. Course numbers vary. Prerequisite: junior standing

Honors 685 (Honors Tutorial; 3H cr): An independent study course for students who cannot arrange independent study through one of the departments. Prerequisite: junior standing.

Honors 686 (Research in Honors; 3 or 6H cr): Students assist a faculty member in his/her research and complete an original and major research project under the supervision of a faculty advisor. Students who complete 6H cr are awarded "Honors with Distinction" on their transcripts. Prerequisite: junior standing and 9 credits.

*Honors 687 (Senior Honors Project; 3H cr; retakable to a max of 6H cr): The Senior Honors Project is intended for students in majors for which an Honors Thesis is not appropriate. It consists of a performance, musical composition, or professional project completed under the supervision of a faculty advisor. Students who complete 6H cr are awarded "Honors with Distinction" on their transcripts. Prerequisite: senior standing.

*Honors 689 (Senior Honors Thesis; 6H cr over two semesters): The Senior Honors Thesis allows students the opportunity to write a paper (usually 50-75 pages) reflecting independent research conducted in their major field of study under the supervision of a faculty advisor. Students who complete the thesis are awarded "Honors with Distinction" on their transcripts. Prerequisite: senior standing.

*Students may not complete both a Senior Thesis and a Senior Project.

Graduate Courses: Qualifying seniors may take courses at the 700-level or above to fulfill Honors College graduation requirements. Permission must be obtained from the instructor, the department chair, and the Honors College Director.

Honors Work at Other Universities (maximum of 9H cr): Transfer students who have participated in an Honors College at their previous school may be eligible for up to 9 honors credits. See an Honors College Advisor.

Study Abroad: Any approved study abroad program may be eligible. However, you must meet with an Honors advisor **prior** to studying abroad to establish eligibility, and **after** you return to arrange for Honors credit.

Registration: Where to Start?

Honors students should meet with an Honors College advisor each semester to discuss their progress toward the Honors College graduation requirements, as well as important details about Priority Registration. Please schedule this appointment to take place after you have met with your school/college academic advisor. Schedule both meetings early in the semester to ensure that both take place before Priority Registration. **NOTE: It is mandatory for new Honors** students to meet with an Honors advisor each semester of their first year, and they will have a hold placed in their PAWS account, which restricts them from registering for classes, until that requirement is met.

Full-time students should try to register for at least one Honors course each semester; parttime students one Honors course every other semester.

Priority Registration

Honors students are offered Priority Registration to ensure they can complete their Honors requirements along with those of their major. Before registration begins, students should check their PAWS account to confirm the Priority Registration time assigned for that semester. Students should be sure to take advantage of the early assigned time!

If you do not get the Honors course of your choice, you have the option of placing yourself on a wait list via PAWS. Students are wait listed on a first come/first served basis, and the Registrar's Office will send you an e-mail notifying you of your status. It is also displayed on the list view of the student class schedule in PAWS. More details on the wait list procedure can be found at: waitlist.uwm.edu.

Announcements of new Honors sections and class space are made via e-mail. Be sure to log in to your UWM e-mail account regularly to avoid missing important information.

Advising

The Honors College staff provides accessible, personalized advising to Honors students. Our advisors are available to help you with Honors course selection, study abroad opportunities, scholarships, graduate or professional school applications, or any other academic matter. Honors advisors use a holistic advising approach while focusing on academic and student development. You may also make an appointment with the Director or Associate Director to discuss your academic plans at any time.

Responsibilities and Expectations

Student

- Clarify and describe your goals, attitudes, interests, and abilities.
- Become knowledgeable about campus and Honors College policies and procedures.
- Schedule advising meetings well in advance and inform your advisor(s) if you are unable to attend.
- Be prepared and on time for advising appointments.
- Take responsibility for your own academic and personal decisions.

<u>Advisor</u>

- Develop a relationship with each student.
- Know policies, procedures, and curriculum while also being able to seek information when needed.
- Monitor progress and openly discuss various student options.
- Be knowledgeable regarding resources on campus for students.
- Keep personal and sensitive information confidential.
- Have an open door policy and drop-in availability.

Honors College Academic Timeline

Be sure to meet with both your school/college and Honors advisors at the beginning of each semester to discuss academic plans.

Freshman Year

- Become familiar with UWM majors, departments, schools and colleges.
- Visit offices around campus to learn more about what UWM has to offer and opportunities to become involved.
- Check your transcript to see if credits transferred correctly (other institutions, AP, IB).

Sophomore Year

- Connect with the Career Development Center with questions about any intended major or interest area.
- If planning to study abroad, talk with the Study Abroad office as well as both advisors.
- Begin thinking about internships and other opportunities for professional development.
- Explore Non-Seminar Honors options.

Junior Year

- Start to solidify plans for post undergraduate plans—graduate, law or medical school; career path; Peace Corps, AmeriCorps, JET Program, etc.
- Enhance your resume/vitae and cover letter.

Senior Year

- Meet with advisors to discuss post-undergraduate plans.
- Apply for graduation with Honors College and UWM.
- Ask faculty for letters of recommendation if applicable.
- Meet with Associate Director to complete your Senior Exit Interview.

College isn't just about what you want to do with your life after you graduate; it's also about who you want to become.

Additional Honors College Resources

Writing Specialist

The Honors College Writing Specialist, Lydia Equitz, is available by appointment to help students plan, write, and revise essays. She also schedules periodic writing workshops that explore the logic and science of writing tools and conventions to help students improve their writing. Students can make an appointment to meet with Lydia by booking a 30-minute time slot using the clipboard on her office door, Honors House 189.

Scholarships

The Honors College offers several scholarship opportunities. Application information is sent by e-mail via the Honors College Listserv, so **be sure to check your UWM e-mail account regularly** for updates regarding these awards. Honors College specific scholarships are usually announced in October for winter and spring and in late December/early January for summer and fall.

Additionally, the Honors College provides personal scholarship advising for students. Check with an Honors advisor for additional help regarding any Honors College scholarships.


